















Consecration of Wangduephodrang Dzong

Ten years after a fire razed it to the ground, the Wangduephodrang Dzong once again adorns the fabled hill, resembling the trunk of a sleeping elephant.

The historic Wangduephodrang Dzong, rebuilt to its former glory upon Royal Command, was consecrated on November 11, coinciding with the Birth Anniversary of His Majesty The Fourth Druk Gyalpo.

The Tashi Rabney (consecration) of the Dzong was attended by His Majesty The King, His Majesty the Fourth Druk Gyalpo, Her Majesty the Gyaltsuen, Their Royal Highnesses Gyalsey Jigme Namgyel and Gyalsey Ugyen Wangchuck, and Members of the Royal Family.

His Holiness the Je Khenpo presided over the ceremony and the prayers, which began on November 9.

Tashi Ngasoel prayers were performed, and Mendel Ku, Sung, and Thukten Thinley were offered to His Majesty The King, His Majesty the Fourth Druk Gyalpo, and the Je Khenpo by representatives of the Dzongkhag at the Zhabdrung Tong-ku Lhakhang of the Dzong.

The ceremony was attended by the Prime Minister, Ministers, the Ambassador of India to Bhutan, and relevant government officials, as well as the people of Wangduephodrang Dzongkhag.

The DSP training was held at Doksum in Trashi Yangtse.



WANGDUEPHODRANG DZONG RECONSTRUCTION PROJECT:



A TESTAMENT TO THE UNIQUE TIES BETWEEN BHUTAN AND INDIA

The historic Wangduephodrang Dzong has served as the seat of the District Monk Body and the District Administration of Wangduephodrang Dzongkhag since 1638. One of the most important heritage sites in Bhutan, the Dzong, was damaged in a fire incident in June 2012. To restore the Dzong to its former glory, the reconstruction of Wangduephodrang Dzong was taken up as a Development Partnership Project between India and Bhutan in 2014.

The reconstruction project has incorporated disaster-resilient features for fire and earthquake safety without losing the essence of traditional construction techniques and cultural heritage values. The project was implemented by the Department of Culture in Bhutan.

Key parts of the project include rebuilding a three-story Kuenrey (lhakhang), a four-story Utse (central tower), Shab-khor (surrounding structure) in the 1st and 2nd courtyards, Du-Khang (lhakhang), and building a 50-meter-long service tunnel in both courtyards.

During the construction of the project, special efforts were made to maintain Bhutanese essence and architectural elements. A team of skilled local craftspeople worked hard to make murals that show the culture and traditions of Bhutan.

The Government of India is privileged to be a part of this important cultural heritage project. India has contributed 1 billion Ngultrums to the project. The project was completed much ahead of the projected completion date of June 2023. The press release from India in Bhutan (Embassy of India, Thimphu) says that the restoration of this historic Dzong to its former glory is a sign of the special relationship between Bhutan and India, which is based on mutual respect, trust, and friendship.

Ambassador Sudhakar Dalela attended the Tashi Rabney consecration ceremony of the reconstructed Wangduephodrang Dzong on November 11, 2022, in the presence of His Majesty the King, Her Majesty the Gyaltsuen, His Majesty the Fourth Druk Gyalpo, the Je Khenpo, members of the Royal Family, Ministers, senior officials from the Royal Government of Bhutan, local administration, and the people of Wangduephodrang Dzonghag.



PRAYER FLAGS HOISTED



To commemorate His Majesty The Druk Gyalpo's 67th Birth Anniversary, over 250
De-suups volunteered to hoist 2,011 Lungta and Cheyrinze prayer flags for His Majesty's good health and long life. The prayer flags were hoisted along the Buddha Dordenma Road. The initiative started on November 8, 2022, and ended on November 12, 2022.

On November 11, to commemorate the Birth Anniversary of His Majesty The Fourth Druk Gyalpo, 24 De-suups along with 12 officials from the Ministry of Health walked 23.4 km of the Trans Bhutan Trail from Dochula to Punakha Dzong.
